Deakin's growing reputation is reflected in its rapid rise in international rankings; Deakin entered the prestigious Academic Ranking of World Universities for the first time in 2014 and now ranks an estimated 261 (AWRU 2019). Deakin is ranked 29 in the QS ranking of the world's top universities under 50 years.

Established in 1974, Deakin University was named after the leader of the Australian Federation movement and the nation's second Prime Minister, Alfred Deakin.

School of Psychology

Deakin's School of Psychology is one of the largest and most progressive psychology departments in Australia. We are one of five Schools within the Faculty of Health, and have a strong presence in Melbourne, **Geelong and Warrnambool.** At undergraduate level, almost a third of our students study online while they live and work in places as distant as Alaska, as remote as the North-West Kimberley, or as nearby as Box Hill.

Teaching and Learning

The School offers accredited programs in Psychology at undergraduate and postgraduate levels. The two major undergraduate programs are the Bachelor of Psychological Science and the Bachelor of Psychology (with Honours). We also offer research degrees at Masters and PhD level and accredited professional masters and doctoral programs in Clinical and Organisational Psychology.

There are two things that really distinguish our teaching programs from others.

The first is relevance: Our teaching programs focus on providing the knowledge and skill- base that make our graduates highly valuable in the employment market. We prepare our students so, regardless of the level of study at which they graduate, they understand the employment opportunities available to them, what employers look for in potential employees, how to market themselves, and how they can develop themselves and their careers over their working lives.

The second is flexibility: We are national and international leaders in providing flexible learning options for students. Our undergraduate programs are available both on campus and online, so students can choose to study face-to-face or in the cloud environment or a mix of both. 'Online' no longer means 'alone': the same level of interaction and support from our staff is available regardless of the mode in which any student chooses to study. Deakin's trimester system allows students to fast-track their undergraduate program to the extent that it is possible to complete in just two years.

Research and Research Training

The School of Psychology is home to over 130 research/academic staff and 170 PhD students. Our flagship research centre is the Centre for Social and Early Emotional Development (SEED), which is focused on the developmental and intergenerational factors that contribute to healthy social and emotional development of children and young adults. We also have significant profiles in substance misuse and addiction, violence prevention, neurodevelopmental disorders, body image and eating disorders, well-being, disability, mental health, and cognitive neuroscience, among others. Much of this work is carried out through one of our research hubs, several of which overlap with SEED. They include:

- Australian Centre for Behavioural Research in Diabetes (ACBRD)
- Deakin Child Study Centre (DCSC)
- Cognitive Neuroscience Unit (CNU)
- Centre for Drug Use, Addictive and Anti-Social Behaviour Research (CEDAAR)
- Australian Centre on Quality of Life (ACQOL)
- Science of Adult Relationships Laboratory (SOAR)

The School has significant clinical and research partnerships with industry bodies. Some examples of these include: Barwon Health, Murdoch Children's Research Institute, Diabetes Australia, Eastern Health, Monash Health, Australian Unity, Turning Point, Youth Substance Abuse Service, Odyssey House, Yooralla, and the Victoria Police. These partnerships are central to our mission to answer questions that make a difference to the communities we inhabit and serve.

Research Fellow, Trial Lead

Research only Level A

Level A members of staff typically perform these duties at the following levels:

Position Context

A trial of mind body interventions was recently funded by the Medical Research Future Fund (MRFF) (MRFF1200214 'A Randomized Controlled Trial Comparing Yoga, Cognitive Behaviour Therapy and Education to Improve Quality of Life and Reduce Healthcare Costs in Endometriosis' over 5 years). The trial is being run through the School of Psychology at Deakin University, in collaboration with a number of other universities and hospitals.

This is an exciting opportunity to manage day-to-day operations of a cutting edge trial. The position involves co-ordinating and managing the trial. The Research Fellow, Trial Lead will ensure the trial is managed according to the guidelines for good clinical practice (GCP) and ethical standards, thus ensuring the safety and protection of trial participants and the integrity of research data. They will be responsible for setting up systems and processes for efficient running of the trial, as well as recruitment, follow up, and data management. The Research Fellow, Trial Lead will work with the Chief Investigators to ensure every aspect of the study runs smoothly, from recruitment, to patient screening, completion of surveys, completion of interventions, as well as adherence and safety checks.

The aim of the study is to:

 Test yoga, and cognitive behaviour therapy, compared to an education group to improve the quality of life, pain, mental health and fatigue of people with endometriosis.

The Research Fellow, Trial Lead is a new fixed-term position, funded until December 31, 2023, located within the School of Psychology, in the Faculty of Health. If further funding is secured, there may be opportunity for continuation/ extension.

The Research Fellow, Trial Lead will work with support, guidance, and direction from the Chief and Associate Investigators. This position will be located in a collegial team, including research only and administrative support staff, as well as Higher Degree by Research students. The appointee will also have the opportunity to liaise with external researchers and clinicians.

Primary responsibilities

The Research Fellow, Trial Lead is responsible for activities associated with the aim of the study including day-to-day running of the study, including liaising with clinical sites providing ethics and governance support, and basic data management, such as developing and overseeing recruitment and participation databases:

- develops and provides guidance on trial database management
- coordinating ethics amendments and overseeing adherence to ethics requirements
- coordinating recruitment for the study, including advertising

- follows patients as per protocol and, where necessary, facilitates participant withdrawal from a study in order to ensure the patient's best care and the effective achievement of the study aims.
- ensures the protocol is met and maintains the interest and support of participants and researchers
- maintaining regular contact with study participants to ensure retention and document reasons for withdrawal
- managing all survey points, including baseline, 2 months, 6 months and 12 months
- maintains integrity of information in case record forms and databases, taking steps to collect the data, checking the consistency and accuracy of data and making appropriate corrections.
- administrative and communications support including word processing, information dissemination and arranging meetings as directed by the Chief Investigators
- regular reporting on progress and problem solving
- assists with the preparation of Annual Progress Reports for the HREC and funding bodies.

Performance expectations

Annual performance objectives and expected outcomes will be defined for this role in accordance with the Minimum Standards and Typical Duties for Academic Levels (MSTDALs) and Faculty Research Expectation Models (FREMs). Specific duties will be allocated with reference to the applicable Workload Allocation Model (WAM). These documents are updated from time to time and are available on request.

Selection criteria

Qualifications and experience:

- Master's degree in a health related field such as psychology, or an advanced nursing degree
- sound clinical trials experience including trial set-up, coordination and project management.
- experience in data management, and record keeping (including participant flow through a clinical trial)
- experience managing intervention study databases
- experience preparing study protocols, ethics applications, and study materials

Capabilities and personal attributes:

- excellent project coordination skills with the ability to support projects through to completion in accordance with agreed standards and timeframes
- excellence in communicating with patients / research participants, including experience with recruitment to clinical trials
- high-level organisational skills, including ability to maintain a high standard of data recordkeeping, reporting, meeting competing deadlines, and setting priorities.
- proven ability to adhere to protocols, standards and guidelines, including a thorough understanding of confidentiality, privacy and research ethics principles as required
- proficiency in microsoft office suite (word, excel, powerpoint, outlook), microsoft sharepoint, redcap, qualtrics
- excellent written and oral communication skills, including ability to interact well with a range of internal and external staff and project stakeholders (e.g. people with endometriosis, yoga therapists, gynaecologists, research staff, endometriosis support groups).

- demonstrated ability to work as an effective member of a team as well as the ability to exercise high levels of independence, judgement and initiative
- attention to detail
- ability to travel between study sites in Melbourne and Geelong
